Overview of Open Access POLICY FOR NUMID HORIZON: AN INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF NURSING AND MIDWIFERY

Through *the Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery* authors of accepted papers are required to pay a token to support an open access publication to make their paper freely available online immediately via the journal website, meaning that readers will not need a journal subscription to view open access content. Open access articles are clearly indicated on the journal's online contents page.

Open access licenses

Articles published by Numid Horizon Journal: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery are made freely available online immediately upon publication, without subscription barriers to access. Authors who choose to participate in the *Open Access* initiative and pay to have their paper freely available online will be asked to sign an open access license agreement. The information below constitute the licensing agreement.



In submitting an article for publication by Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery I certify that;

1. I am authorized by my co-authors to enter into these arrangements.
2. I warrant, on behalf of myself and my co-authors, that:
 - o the article is original, has not been formally published in any other peer-reviewed journal, is not under consideration by any other journal and does not infringe any existing copyright or any other third party rights;
 - o I am/We are the sole author(s) of the article and have full authority to enter into this agreement and in granting rights to Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery I/we will not be in breach of any other obligation;
 - o the article contains nothing that is unlawful, libelous, or which would, if published, constitute a breach of contract or of confidence or of commitment given to secrecy;
 - o I/We have taken due care to ensure the integrity of the article. To my/our knowledge and based on currently accepted scientific knowledge all statements contained in it purporting to be facts are true and any formula or instructions contained in the article will not, if allowed accurately, cause any injury, illness or damage to the user".
3. I, and all co-authors, agree that the article, if editorially accepted for publication, shall be licensed under the National Media Commission of



Ghana in line with Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery Open Data Policy, data included in the article shall be made available under the conditions specified by the National Media Commission of Ghana, unless otherwise stated. If the law requires that the article be published in the public domain, I/we will notify Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery at the time of submission, and in such cases not only the data but also the article shall be released under the Copyright Act 2005 (Act 690). For the avoidance of doubt it is stated that sections 1 and 2 of this license agreement shall apply and prevail regardless of whether the article is published under conditions specified by the National Media Commission of Ghana or the Copyright Act 2005 (Act 690).

Explanatory notes regarding Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery License Agreement.

As an aid to our authors, the following paragraphs provide some brief explanations concerning the Copyright laws of Ghana that apply to the articles published in Numid Horizon: An International Journal of Nursing and Midwifery published journals and the rationale for why we have chosen these licenses. The National Media Commission is a government of Ghana agency mandated with the responsibility of registering, regulating and monitoring the activities of media houses in Ghana, The National Media Commission was set on July 7, 1993



by an Act of Parliament. The National Media Commission Act 1993, Act 449 in pursuit of the provisions of Chapter 12 of Ghana's 1992 Constitution is enjoined among others to take all measures to ensure the establishment and maintenance of the highest journalistic standards on mass media, including investigation, mediation and settlement of complaints made against or by the press or other mass media, to make regulations by constitutional instrument for the registration of newspapers and other publications, except that the regulations shall not provide for the exercise of any direction or control over the professional functions of a person engaged in the production of newspapers or other means of mass communication.

The Copyright Act is the legal framework that protects the use of an individual's work once the idea has been physically expressed. It is a form of intellectual property that protects original works of authorship of literary, dramatic, musical and artistic works such as poetry, novels, movies, songs, computer software and architecture. Ghana's current copyright law is Act 690 issued by the Parliament of the Republic of Ghana. It was enacted on May 17, 2005 and replaced Parliament's Act No. 110, the country's previous Copyright law from 1985

Open access content has to be freely available online, and through licensing their work under CC BY authors grant users the right to unrestricted dissemination and re-use of the work, with only the one proviso that proper attribution is given to authors. This liberal licensing is best suited to facilitate the transfer and growth of scientific knowledge.



The Copyright Act, 2005 (Act 690) provides the following summary (where 'you' equals 'the user'):

You are free to:

- Share — copy and redistribute the material in any medium or format.
- Adapt — remix, transform, and build upon the material for any purpose, even commercially.

The licensor cannot revoke these freedoms as long as you follow the license terms.

Under the following terms:

- Attribution— you must give *appropriate credit*, provide a link to the license, and *indicate if changes were made*. You may do so in any reasonable manner, but not in any way that suggests the licensor endorses you or your use.
- No additional restrictions—you may not apply legal terms or *technological measures* that legally restrict others from doing anything the license permits.

Notices

You do not have to comply with the license for elements of the material in the public domain or where your use is permitted by an applicable exception or limitation.



No warranties are given. The license may not give you all of the permissions necessary for your intended use. For example, other rights such as publicity, privacy, or moral rights may limit how you use the material.
